## Meetings and Activities in December



The SILA program meeting on Wednesday, December 2, at the Downtown Magnets High School, featured a presentation by GEM (Governor Ever More) Sandy Schultz on Project Slerra: A Family And A Future. Project Slerra is the current "Quadrennial Project" of Soroptimist International from 2007-2011. SI is working in partnership with another nonprofit, Hope and Homes for Children, to raise \$2 million to transform the lives of some of the most deprived women and children in the world. Sierra Leone, on the west coast of Africa, is ranked as the poorest country in the world following a decade of war in which 500,000 people were killed, raped, or injured. Over half the population was made homeless and thousands of children were orphaned or separated from their families. Project Slerra focuses on three primary areas: supporting young mothers who were often inpregnated after being trafficked into sex slavery and are often alienated from their families because of the stigma of having a child outside of marriage; assisting children living alone on the streets to return to a caring family environment, to get counselling, an education and a future; and providing integrated child and family support to fragile families headed by lone women or frail grandparents needing housing, healthcare and access to income generation. These three elements of Project SIerra will become replicable models of excellence in child protection and childcare shared with other NGOs in Sierra Leone, ensuring Project Slerra will benefit generations to come. SILA supports Project Slerra with a \$500 contribution every year during the quadrennial. For more information, check out www.projectSlerra.org.
