#### Identity Fraud Prevention

At SILA's program meetings in May, identify security expert **Robin Johnson** provided important advice about current identify fraud threats. She emphasized that 85% of identity theft are crimes of opportunity, many of which could have been avoided.

In her presentation about check fraud, she pointed out how easy it is for theives to misuse personal checks. One easy way to deter theft is to always use a gel ink pen when writing and signing personal checks. This ink cannot be easily washed from the check stock.

Another crimes of opportunity takes place at the gas pump. Identity thieves can easily implant a small "skimmer" device onto the pumps which can record a person's credit card number and key code. **Robin** recommends always paying for gas at the counter, not at the pump.





If a password is needed for the Internet when away from home or work, security experts advise to imbed

your password in a line of random numbers and letters in your word processor. From that nonsense line, cut/paste the password into the password space. Internet crooks track the keystrokes typed on a line, not the letters themselves.

Lastly, always completely close down and reopen your internet browser after doing online banking or shopping before going online again. Further advice can be found at the <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u>.

Congressmember Bass directed SILA's monetary award that accompanies the Ruby Award to this Scholarship Fund in honor of her daughter and son-in-law who were tragically killed in a car accident in 2006.

#### Memorial to Betsy MacCracken

SILA's oldest living member, **Dr. Betsy MacCracken**, has died at the age of 97 years. Although she had moved to Fresno in 1988, she continued her membership in SILA until her death.

During World War II, Betsy joined the WAVES and served as a commissioned U.S. Naval Officer. After the war, she practiced medicine, joining the faculty of the Department of Pediatrics at the College of Osteopathic Physicians and Surgeons in Los Angeles (which later became the medical school at the University of California at Irvine) and the Pediatrics staff at the LA County Hospital. She earned a Masters in Public Health in 1961 from U.C. Berkeley, joined the LA Board of Public Health, and was named LA County's Epidemiologist in 1969.



After many years of medical service, Betsy returned to Fresno moving into The Terraces of San Joaquin Gardens, where she was an active member of the community serving on committees,

arranging special events and engaging in her hobbies, which included photography, knitting and crocheting. Dr. MacCracken also designed and created several needlepoint renderings of Navajo rugs illustrating her love of the southwest and her many trips to Sedona, Arizona.

Betsy was an active member of Soroptimist International of Los Angeles, serving as President in 1955-56 and as chair of several committees. **Barbara Jury** remembers that Betsy was the 1987-88 Fellowship Honoree and was also a Director for the Foundation, which, at that time, was a separate committee whose mandate was to earn funds to support Soroptimist House through rummage sales and the fashion show as described in our February (2012) newsletter.

"SILA was very important to Aunt Betsy," noted her niece **Susan Hancock**. "The support for women, particularly those going to college, was one of her priorities, so the establishment of Soroptimist House and the awarding of scholarships were high on her list and one of the things she loved about SILA."
