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

SILA had a great day at Hollywood Primary Center on Friday, February 14th - Valentine's Day.

We were greeted by our own SILA Member, **Dr. Dona Lawrie**, Principal. Hollywood Primary Center is a Kindergarten through 3rd Grade school. The children are provided with breakfast, lunch and a snack. Many of the children stay until 6pm.

Everyone at the school was ready for the special program called *Reading is FUNdamental*. The students were allowed to wear party dresses and every classroom was prepared to present Valentines and flowers to each SILA Member. We were special!

Each class from 3rd grade to transition kindergarten came into the decorated school library and walked around the tables where age appropriate books were displayed. Each student could pick out a book to take home. SILA Members sat behind the tables to help the students decide what book they would like.

Some had difficulty making choices. They reminded of me shopping when I need to look at everything before deciding. The second graders took the longest - they all wanted chapter books. The fastest in making a decision were the kindergarten transition classes. What joy on our part to see the students looking at their books and sharing their choices with their friends.

#### **Update on DWC**

**Hanna Mora**, a representative for our 2014 Ruby Award Winner, **Lisa Watson**, CEO <u>Downtown Women's Center</u> (DWC), came to speak at our SILA Program Meeting on February 5, 2014 at Taix Restaurant. Hannah is Development Associate at DWC and she gave an outstanding presentation and update on DWC. She also said how very honored DWC was to be selected as SILA Ruby Award Winner.

Hanna's role is to oversee numerous aspects of fundraising and coordination of a number of benefits and events. She has only been with DWC since September but has seen growth and forward movement for the women in the shelter, especially regarding community interest and support.

The DWC was founded in 1978 and is now reaching 4300 women per year. It is the only organization in Los Angeles exclusively dedicated to addressing the immediate and long-term needs of women overcoming poverty and homelessness on downtown's Skid Row.

Their approach provides a wrap-around service which includes basic needs, housing, health and well-being where women can receive mammograms, education and job readiness training.

The average age of women as residents is 50 years old and there is a waiting list to obtain an apartment. On an average day there are over 200 women that drop in to the Day Center for basic needs, healthcare and education. 90,000 meals were served last year. The research shows that 95% of the women who go through these programs do not return to homelessness.



At present, there are also two <u>MADE by DWC</u> social enterprises - a resale boutique and café. You can sample their great food and go shopping at their downtown location at 438 S. San Pedro Street. Click <u>here</u> for more info.
