The Soroptimist Club of Los Angeles is the third oldest Soroptimist Club in the world, and ranks first in number of mem-

Mrs. Sallie D. Richardson was the first Soroptimist in Los Angeles.

Of the twenty-six members who attended the first group meeting on Monday, April 10, 1922, twelve are members of the Club at present: Oda Faulconer, Frances E. Shaner, Delphine Sutcliffe, Lillian Grandmason, Ruth Sapp, Veturia C. Armstrong, Sylvia Harding, Olga McNeile, Charlotte Brown, Alice Edwards, Franc Dillon, Gertrude Griffith.

Alice Mayor Edwards was one of the four Group Captains appointed at the first meeting. At the second meeting, her group had the largest attendance.

Oda Faulconer was the first speaker to address the Club, speaking on "School Bonds." Dr. Armstrong, the second speaker, spoke on the Sewerage System of Los An-

The first ATTENDANCE PRIZE given in the Club was donated by Florence E. Banks and drawn by Della Hubbard.

The Charter Membership was closed on July 18, 1922, with a total membership of 113. Today we have a membership of 170, with many applications before our Classification Committee.

The Club has evidenced a steady, healthy growth since the beginning, and the constant aim has been "for quality, not for quantity."

To write 1922-113, and 1927-170 is not at all indicative of the progress that has been made. Of the original 113 Charter Members, only 47 are members of the Club today. This fact alone shows that we have acquired 66 new members to take the places of 66 of the original Charter Members, plus 57 others to make the 170, to say nothing of those who have come in to take the places vacated from year to year.
